I. Participatory Learning: An innovative approach towards quality assurance in education.

Objective:

The College aims at fully integrating the learners in the dynamics of teaching-learning process in order that such an inclusive approach would foster academic growth. Participatory learning, which the College prioritizes does not replace the traditional top-down approach altogether. What it aims at is a greater degree of flexibility afforded to learners to choose subjects of their choice, which, in the main, extends to having their leeway in suggesting introduction of preferred subjects. This momentous, paradigm shift would substantially contribute to the academic environment of the Institution, thereby enabling the students to study in an ambience of intellectual camaraderie. Such expansive pedagogical approach would make the teaching-learning process exciting and rewarding.

Context: The swift changes in global educational scenario exact up-to-date syllabuses that train learners to respond to the call of the hour. Keeping this in view, the College introduces the syllabuses in conformity with UGC guidelines, and makes regular revision. Continuation evaluation is made through regular tests conducted by the respective departments. Further, Internal assessment as well as semester end examinations put the learners to grueling tests to excel themselves.

The College engages in constant interaction with students to improve on existing examination practices.

Regular brainstorming sessions are held to decide upon possibilities offered by the changing academic scenario. This results in devising application oriented, skill-based and job oriented syllabus that further necessitate application of ICT and state-of-the-art pedagogical aids. The College has been laying emphasis on this. The success is promising too.

Providing greater flexibility to students in matters of selection of streams as well as subjects is another remarkable feature of the educational system of the College. This flexibility gives students the freedom to make informed choices in selection of streams and subjects.

Practice: Through a diverse array of exercises - academic, aesthetic and physical - such as learning, participation in seminars, case studies, competitions, excursions, yoga and games, sports, athletic meets, literary programmes, etc., students are exposed to the varieties of life, the knowledge of which makes them complete. The College ensures this. This is made possible by participatory learning. Such a learning method helps learners gain onsite experience by study tours and field studies. The teachers function as facilitators in the learners' acquisition of skills and expertise. Importantly, all this is done with the stated objective of maximizing the greater good of the society, or what is referred to as an awareness of our social responsibility.

As for acquiring linguistic competence, which is crucial to communication, a language laboratory functions in the College to improve interactive learning.

Steps are being taken to make audio-visual and power point presentations in all classes to make teaching more effective and to help learners grasp things better.

Evidence of Success: The College has been successful in its mission. However, new missions give new challenges. And the College loves to face them.

Problems encountered & Resources required: The obvious problems that obstruct the realization of the objectives are inadequate infrastructural facilities and finance. Such difficulties impact on the organization of frequent national and international seminars and conferences. Infrastructural inadequacy also affects effective delivery of lectures and extensive use of ICT in teaching-learning process. However, the College manages to excel itself in the midst of difficulties. The College looks forward to overcoming the obstacles with the funds to be made available under RUSA. It looks forward to signing MoUs with business concerns, industries, and other establishments to enter into strategic partnership with the primary objective of honing the professional skills of the students. The College thinks of introducing advanced evaluation techniques to reform the existing one.

II. Innovative Tutor-ward relationship: A strong bondage for institutional academic atmosphere.

Objective:

- * To ensure good relationship between teachers and students.
- * To hear the grievances of the students and to immediately redress the grievances.
- * To help the students orientate themselves in the proper academic direction.
- * To inculcate values in the students.

The context: The most distressing thing for the educational system could be the dropout rates of students. The factors leading to this could be fear of unemployment, adjustment of oneself in a new environment or pressure of study. But the primary one is the lack of interest in the students for study, which has, again, to do with the degree of affinity between the teacher and the student. What is important is a teacher's empathy towards the student. Tutor-ward relationship is as important as infrastructural development of the institution.

The practice: The College, therefore, lays utmost emphasis on tutor-ward relationship, not just to ensure good relationship between teachers and students, but also to provide the students the vital motivation to excel. The results of this emphasis are, thus, outstanding and tangible. The College would continue to underline this as its prime commitment.

Evidence of success: Personal interaction with students really produces good results. Remarkable attitudinal changes are seen in the students. Students not only attend classes in large numbers and regularly, but they feel free to discuss with their teachers the matters that confront them. The institution, thus, does not just remain a site of education, but also a place for realizing what it means to be human.
